Meeting the needs of the next generation

The International Teachers Conference at Villa Boccella near Lucca, Italy, is the highlight of the ERT's year. 51 teachers and governors from the family of schools around the world came together to study, reflect, and enjoy one another's company in the glorious setting of the Villa and its gardens.

For the first time Report's editor attended. But only for a day and a half, alas, when a domestic emergency called him back to London.

Conference leader Hilary Wyatt asked everyone to keep a journal. Mine includes Tom Bree's Sacred Geometry sessions which patiently guided us tracing a complex pattern with compass and ruler. What is the Ethos of a St James School?

A group of heads and governors have been asking this question over the past year. It's important to be able to state to parents, prospective teachers and other stakeholders what it is that distinguishes our schools.

The International Teachers Conference gave us an opportunity to agree an answer. There will be refinements made by each school to fit local conditions, but the following gives the gist.

"The education provided by the family of schools is founded on philosophy. A core theme is the belief that behind the differences apparent in each child, there is a conscious, intelligent and loving spirit which all have in common."

Simple practices of self-awareness are part of the daily routine of school life. These allow both teachers and pupils to find a natural peace and stillness which is beyond the usual movement and agitation. By focusing firmly in the present, pupils can discover and utilise their individual talents and unlimited potential.

This philosophic approach supports academic excellence as well as artistic, physical and emotional development.

The national curriculum, where required, in each location is enhanced by a unique range of subjects and practices."

Too long to list in full here, these subjects and practices include:

'The Pause practised regularly through the day, the practice of focussed attention, and mantra-based meditation offered from age 10'

'Practice of the human virtues such as honesty, generosity, harmlessness, compassion, forgiveness, wisdom, courage and love'

'Use of finest materials'

'Vegetarian food'

'Learning and reciting beautiful texts by heart'

'A spirit of enquiry in all subjects'

'Practical philosophy classes that inspire a love of wisdom'

'Classical languages which include Sanskrit'

'Respect for one another'

'Proper respect for authority'

'A spirit of service in daily school life'

'Supportive partnerships between school and home'

'Teachers leading by example.'
